## Olivia's Croatia **Road Trip**



### Stop 1 **Zrmanja**

### Stop 2 Cerovac Caves

### Stop 7 **Zaton**

We stopped at this charming historical seaside village and savoured the laid-back local atmosphere. The tranquil beaches and clear waters made Zaton a lovely spot to unwind and watch the sun set over the Adriatic.



### Stop 8 **Zadar**

Our final road trip stop was the historic city of Zadar. The city perfectly blends ancient Roman ruins with modern attractions. We strolled the old town's charming streets, enjoyed a meal together, and took in the local atmosphere.





## What to know before you go to **Croatia**

### What to Expect

Croatia has a diverse cultural heritage influenced by various civilizations, including Roman, Venetian, and Austro-Hungarian. Expect a blend of historical sites, lively festivals, and a strong emphasis on family and community life. Croatian cuisine varies by region, with Mediterranean influences along the coast (seafood, olive oil, and fresh vegetables) and more hearty, Central European dishes inland (meats, stews, and pastries). Don't miss trying local specialties like Peka (slow-cooked meat) and seafood risotto.

### Language

Croatian is the official language. English is widely spoken in tourist areas, especially in major cities, hotels, and restaurants. In more remote regions, knowledge of Croatian or basic phrases can be helpful.

### Currency

The official currency of Croatia is the Euro (€) since January 2023, replacing the Croatian Kuna (HRK). Credit and debit cards are widely accepted, but it's still useful to have some cash on hand for smaller transactions or in rural areas.

### Time Zone

Croatia is in the Central European Time (CET) zone, which is GMT+1. Like many European countries, Croatia observes Daylight Saving Time, moving the clocks forward one hour to Central European Summer Time (CEST), or GMT+2, from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October.





### **Plug Adaptor**

Croatia uses Type C and F electrical outlets, with a standard voltage of 230V and a frequency of 50Hz. If your devices use a different plug type, you'll need a plug adaptor.

### **Airport Locations**

Zagreb Airport (Franjo Tuđman Airport - ZAG): Located about 10 km from the city center, it is the largest and busiest airport in Croatia.

Split Airport (SPU): Located 24 km from Split, serving the central Dalmatian region.

Dubrovnik Airport (DBV): Situated 20 km southeast of Dubrovnik, serving the southern Dalmatian coast.

Zadar Airport (ZAD): About 8 km from Zadar, it serves the northern Dalmatian region.

Rijeka Airport (RJK): Located on the island of Krk, about 30 km from Rijeka city center.







Like most of continental Europe, Croatian motorists drive on the right.

- Seat belts must be worn by drivers and passengers at all times, regardless of where you happen to be travelling.
- Though the speed limit in urban centres is 50 kph, you can drive up to limits of 130 kph on clear stretches along the motorway.
- Bring your driving license and rental agreement everywhere you go.
- Avoid any alcohol prior to getting behind the wheel because there is zero tolerance for drinking and driving in the country.
- On-the-spot fines are sometimes issued by Croatian Police for minor motor regulation infringements.

### What do I need to hire a car with Enterprise
